Speaking to members of the 20 Miracle Miles Chamber of Commerce, Wilbur Ternyik, Florence, said the OCCDC's land use planning effort regarding the coast was not listened to strongly on the state level. The OCCDC was in existence for four years until is was superseded by the LCDC.
